

New Zealand Short Term Training Scholarships Online Trade Policy

Overview

The New Zealand Government's Manaaki New Zealand Scholarships Programme is pleased to offer an Online Trade Policy course for ASEAN and Timor-Leste scholars, supported by the New Zealand International Development Cooperation Programme.

This is an intensive short course designed for participants from eligible ASEAN countries and Timor-Leste who are currently in middle and senior management positions working in relevant sectors.

The online course is run over a four-week period, consisting of two three-hour sessions per week and will be run by the University of Auckland's Public Policy Institute. The expectation would be that scholars are available to complete the entire learning programme over the four weeks online.

The online training allows for part-time learning, while ensuring continued scholar engagement. While the course does not constitute a formal tertiary qualification it will provide scholars with unique insights into New Zealand approaches and best practice in each sectoral study area.

On completion each scholar will be awarded a completion certificate from the Manaaki New Zealand Scholarships Programme.

When?

Online Trade Policy course for participants from ASEAN countries and Timor-Leste will commence on **5 February 2024** and will complete on **8 March 2024.** This course will be delivered online on a part-time basis.

Participants will need to be available and have suitable internet to access their online training course, and any subsequent meetings related to the course.





Who should attend?

MANAAKI

This course is suitable for officials with at least 5 years' work experience in the relevant course sector. Participants should have basic level computer literacy and numeracy.

To be eligible for a Manaaki New Zealand Scholarship, all the following statements must be true:

- From the date my application is submitted, I will have lived in my country of citizenship for the last two years • or more.
- Exception for diplomatic corps and their family: A member of the diplomatic corps or a dependant of a member of the diplomatic corps, living outside their own country, can apply for a Scholarship.
- I am not a citizen or permanent resident of any of the following countries: New Zealand, Australia, Bahrain, Canada, any European Union country, Iceland, Israel, Japan, Kuwait, Norway, Oman, Qatar, Russia, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, South Korea, Switzerland, the United Arab Emirates, the United Kingdom, or the United States of America.
- Exceptions: People from the following countries and territories are eligible to apply: •
 - Niue and Tokelau, even though they are New Zealand citizens.
 - French Pacific Territories, even though they are French citizens.
 - New Zealand-Samoan and Timor-Leste-Portuguese dual citizens.
 - I will be at least 18 years old at the time I start the scholarship.
- I am not currently serving in the military. •
- Within the last five years, I have not had a New Zealand Scholarship terminated.

Applicants must also acknowledge and agree that:

- They have received endorsement from my employer to attend this training programme.
- They expect to meet the academic entry requirements (including English language requirements) for my • planned training programme.

Presenters

The course will deliver leading expertise from the University of Auckland, including the Public Policy Institute, the School of Population Health, and the Business School. Industry experts who are considered world-class authorities will also be invited to ensure the highest quality content.

Key Learning Outcomes

Trade

Ability to identify the key intersections between international economic policy and health and environmental policy, and critically assess policy coherence (or identify incoherence).

Critically appraise challenges and opportunities associated with complex geo-political and economic factors and their impacts on trade relationships.

Ability to identify the key stakeholders - both within and outside the economic sector - that are impacted by trade policy, as well as their respective interests and priorities, including Indigenous economies and trade.

Understand and balance the connections between the public health and environmental objectives when conducting regulatory impact assessments and future directions in trade.
